ABOR'S first week in office in 2001 after 27 years of CLP rule was characterised soothing words from then chief minister Clare Martin.

The only public servant to be sacked was former CLP election candidate Margaret Lyons, whose presence in the Chief Minister's Department made the new rulers uncomfortable.


She was only too happy to

the 1980s and 1990s. He was enticed out of retirement to work out how to get the CLP back into power and, once there, how to remodel government.

Seven department chief executives were sacked on his orders after being offered alternative jobs in the public service that their pride would not allow them to accept.

Ten new departmental heads were brought in, two of them out of retirement and nearly all of them Fuller's associates from the old glory days of Marshall Perron.

How 10 blokes — and they are all blokes - can be cheaper than six blokes and a woman is puzzling, especially when they are being paid at least as much as those sacked. Many of the new chief executives are known CLP men.

Chief Minister Terry Mills says the break-up of "mega departments" into smaller units will enable the public service to be more focused and efficient.

It would not be fair to judge if this is true for a year or two.

And it should be acknowledged that many experienced public servants thought the big departments, especially NRETAS, were unwieldy.

Having said that, rank-andfile bureaucrats are questioning the need for the total makeover. Were they really that bad? Was service really that awful?
