Mr Petrich, who founded the party in 1986, confirmed he would resign as from April 28 but denied the party was in crisis or faced any difficulties. "I am stepping down as president because the constitution, which I wrote, says party pre-

wrote, says party pre-sidents cannot continue after three consecutive terms," Mr Petrich said.

But he admitted the constitution came into effect only in 1988 which would allow him another term and his sudden resignation in an election year might be seen as creating problems for the party.
