It comes two days after Mr Hanrahan's after Mr Hanrahan's controversial sudden resignation as deputy, described by Mr Heaslip as "immature and beyond the realms of his responsibility" because he had failed to inform Mr Hatton.

Mr Hatton was in-volved in talks today with Mr Warren Anderson, the Sydney prop-erty tycoon behind the city development.

In the letter, Mr Hanrahan claims Mr Heasilp broke clear and strict guidelines for public comment laid down for him after pre-

vious gaffes.

"These should be dealt with by management without fear or favor," he said.

"I withdraw all my support for Mr Heaslip and do not believe he should continue

"It would not be in the best interests of the party for him to do so." Mr Hanrahan refused

comment today. Mr Heaslip said: "Ray is emotionally upset and has turned to the nearest person to kick. It doesn't concern me at all."
