

# Burke tipped new chief

Shane Stone will resign as Northern Territory Chief Minister today, following pressure from disgruntled CLP backbenchers.

The resignation follows a meeting of disenchanted backbenchers and some Cabinet ministers late last week.

The backbenchers said the meeting culminated in a letter of noconfidence being drafted. Mr Stone said the sentiments of the letter were conveyed to him on Friday by his deputy Mike Reed.

Denis Burke is tipped to replace Mr Stone.

# **Activist returns**

High-profile Free Timor activist Rob Wesley-Smith arrived home in Darwin late last night, after being deported from Indonesia.

Australians for a Free East Timor spokesman Sonny Inbaraj said it was believed the Indonesian Armed Forces had a ban on Mr Wesley-Smith.

Mr Inbaraj said Indonesian authorities knew when Mr Wesley-Smith had landed in

Kupang, and had managed to track him to Bali.

Mr Inbaraj, who kept in contact with Mr Wesley-Smith during his detention in a Kupang hotel, said: "It is understood that there are two blacklists in Indonesia.

"One is the Government's blacklist and the other is the Armed Forces' blacklist, led by General Wiranto.

"We understand that Rob's name was removed from the

Government's list, but he remained on the other one.

Mr Inbaraj said Mr Wesley-Smith was "very disappointed", and had labelled the incident as "an indication of the doublefaced policy in East Timor".

Mr Inbaraj said Mr Wesley-Smith had taken a risk by entering Indonesia, knowing that he had been on the Government's blacklist for years. He said: "Rob decided to take a chance, but unfortunately he had to return."

# Resignation is m own choice: Stone

Outgoing Chief Minister Shane Stone said yesterday his resignation was "pretty much" of his own timing and came only slightly sooner than he had planned.

Mr Stone said yesterday: "I knew some people were snapping at my heels.

"I looked at it and thought: 'Do I want to go through this for the next few months or not?' I decided not.

"And remember it was I who called the meeting today.

He said he had made up his mind almost a year ago to quit about June this year.

He said: "Those backbenchers who are doing all the talking didn't have a unanimous position in the party by any means."

He said he had not received a letter demanding his resignation.

Mr Stone – who had four years in the top job will formally resign at a special party meeting this afternoon.

#### Unopposed

Health Minister Denis Burke is expected to be elected unopposed as the new Chief Minis-

Mr Stone said: "It's an amicable transition.

"It's been going on for a while." Mr Stone will stay on as Port Darwin MLA.

Three CLP backbenchers who contacted the Northern Territory News yesterday said Mr Stone had been pushed.

One backbencher, who did not wish to be

named, said: "Basically, we've had enough.
"It's a culmination of things which started

back when Shane appointed himself as QC. "We are basically reflecting the community

Yesterday Mr Stone hosed down suggestions he'd been pushed, saying: "Of course there are always people snapping at your heels — in politics like everything else, there are different personalities at work.'


