More than 80 000 Territorians go to the polls today to choose their government.

A total of 82 314 Territorians are registered to vote in today's election for 25 seats for the Legislative Assembly.

This is an increase of 10832, or 15.1 per cent, on the March 1987 election.

The NT Electoral Office has advised that

static polling booths will open at 8 am today and close at 6 pm when count-

ing starts.

Mobile polling has been under way since last Monday in all Territory rural electorates.

While the election is for 25 seats, the same as in 1983 and 1987, the 1990 redistribution has created four new seats, Greatorex in Alice Springs, and Goyder, Nelson and Brennan in the Top End.

The seats of Flynn and Sadadeen in Alice Springs and Koolpinyah and Ludmilla in the Top End disappeared with the redistribution.

The latest betting yesterday showed no change on the previous market with the CLP still quoted odds-on favorite to win.

Darwin bookmaker Brian Clark had the CLP at 4-7 to win and the ALP at 11-8 to serve its first term in government.

The present composition of the Legislative Assembly is 13 CLP, seven ALP, two Nationals and three indepen-



NT jellies to save lives

Twenty box jellyfish picked up off Mindil Beach on Thursday morning will wing their way to Queensland and the United States this week to help antivenene research.

Museum of Arts and Science jellyfish expert Phil Alderslade regularly col-lects samples from local waters to warn people of the prevalence and dangers of the creature and to gather

the poisonous tentacles for research.
"The research is needed to produce
an improved antivenene because the present one does not counteract all the poisons," he said.

Mr Alderslade said the mix of toxins included one which killed the skin, hence permanent scarring, some which affected the red blood cells and others which paralysed the muscles.

As the museum coelenterates curator and co-ordinator of the Marine Stingers Action Group, he said it was ridiculous that people still entered coastal waters despite the warnings.

Disproving some popular myths, Mr Alderslade found the jellyfish, some of which were potentially lethal, in partic-ularly shallow, crystal-clear water on a glorious morning when there was not a

cloud in the sky.

"Myself and my assistant walked the length of Mindil beach in waist-deep water and found nothing, but coming back into the shallows, where the water was less than knee-deep, they were everywhere," he said.

The collection from Thursday morning held a variety of sizes from 2 cm to 12 cm bodies and Mr Alderslade said anything with a body bigger than a cricket ball could kill a child.

He said tentacles about 60 cm long could stretch a couple of metres when swimming or once attached to some-

Perron can tally his years in NT

Marshall Perron can lay claim to being a third-generation Territorian.

This alone gives him a solid base of support in an area which sees a passing parade of itin-

A tally clerk on the Darwin wharves before his uninterrupted 16 years in the NT Legislative Assembly, he still has reservations about his career in politics.

"I'm still a tally clerk at heart," was one of his better lines.

In the political world of hard knocks, he had a "knock 'em down" teacher in Paul Everingham, to whom he was deputy and treasurer from self-government in 1978.

In August last year, Mr Perron weathered the first political storm since ousting Steve Hatton as leader of the CLP Government in July,

politically wrong.

To long-term Darwin residents, Marshall Perron and Doctors Gully, which he bought in 1979 when he was Lands Minister, are synonymous.

The confrontation was the most recent in a history of controversies involving Mr Perron's unique tourist attraction, where visitors pay to feed thousands of fish which move in with the

The attention given to Doctors Gully by the media and his political opponents is "one of those annoying things that won't go away," Mr Perron said.

"There are some people in the community, sadly, who believe I

cheated an old man out of his property at Doctors Gully by pressing him to sell it to me and that I prostituted the planning system to get a zone change on it.

"They're both untrue.

"However, it's a good example of when you throw enough mud, some of it sticks in the political world."

Mr Perron has spent almost all his life in Darwin and says it was a job as a tally clerk on the Darwin wharf as a 17-year-old that changed his life and forged his political colors.

"The wharves put me against Labor," he said.

"They (the wharf laborers) crippled Dar-win over the most ped-antic matters. It was insane and pointless."

In the meantime, in an area whose population is 22 per cent Aboriginal, he is fighting one of Mr Everingham's fondest causes: land rights.

Should he be elected after today's election, he has a message to take to the special Premiers' Conference in Canberra next week:

"Leave land rights to Territory administra-tion and the Territory will do it better."



Stability - unexciting but NT's best option

TERRITORIANS go to the polls today to decide who is to govern the Northern Territory for the next four years.

After three weeks of campaigning, no major or overriding issues have emerged.

Nevertheless Territorians are being asked to make a choice on two things — stable government and economic management.

On the first it must be emphasised that at the end of the day only two political parties will be able to form government the Country Liberal Party or the Australian Labor Party.

Green and other independents and NT Nationals cannot form government. At best, they can hope only to influence the election through their preferences. At worst, a handful of them may hold the balance of power, forcing one of the parties into an alliance.

It follows that a protest vote for independents is really a vote for potential instability and trouble.

question, the one that will determine today's election result which party is best suited to govern at this stage of the Territory's history?

The evidence says that the Country Liberal Party offers a better chance of stability and progress than Labor.

There is no joy in this statement. The CLP in the past two or three years has patently failed to offer Territorians a vision of better things or to inspire confidence in the future. It has been indecisive and vacillating when hard decisions and steadfast resolution were needed

It has also run an essentially negative campaign at a time

when Territory voters were entitled to learn more about the CLP plans for a better future.

Having said that, it must be added that, as Federal Treas-urer Paul Keating, admitted recently, the CLP Government has managed the Territory's finances prudently.

As a result the Territory is better placed than almost any State to take advantage of the economic recovery when it

The Labor Party began the campaign well but it fell into a hole of its own making immediately after its launch last week. The hole was the lack of costings on its promises.

This is a fatal weakness. A party that cannot get its sums right when in opposition is most unlikely to get its sums right when in government.

<u>Prepare</u>

And since management of the Which brings us to the next economy is the most vital issue confronting voters today - especially after what has happened in some Labor States - it was essential that Labor went to the polls as a credible alternative manager.

They had almost four years to prepare such an alternative and they failed.

This election from the very beginning was about the balance between two factors disenchantment with the CLP against lack of trust in the Labor Party.
