Recycling promises

Two aldermanic candidates have promised to push for Council-backed waste recycling if elected.

Mr Geoff Miers has proposed a "bottlebag collection" backed by Council and run by private enterprise, while Mr Michael Hewett has called for a waste recycling depot at the town dump.

Mr Miers said on Monday national glass manufacturer ICI had expressed interest in extending its glass recycling scheme to Alice Springs.



ACI operates bottlebag collection in 35 Victorian municipalities and shires.

More than half the 200 000 tonnes of bottles ACI produces every year comes from recycling or refilling

Mr Hewett said a waste-recycling depot at the town dump had the potential to be a money spinner to offset the extra costs of rubon people over and above their rates."

He proposed that the depot would employ Council workers on a profit-sharing basis as an incentive to sort reuseable material from the rest.

"Anyone would be en-titled to 'scavenge' through the depot's stockpile to find articles of further use,' Mr Hewett said.

"Wasting precious resources is a crime against nature, which cannot continue to provide for our needs at our current rate of over-consumption and with our wasteful prac-

Mayoral candidate Harvey Millard said this week that pro-posals to upgrade Yulara Airport would threaten the viability of

tourism in Alice Springs.

Ald Millard said Alice Springs would suffer considerably if larger aircraft and more frequent direct services from capital cities were introduced at the resort.

"The efforts of all involved in the promotion and operation of tourism in Central Australia must be to increase the length of stay in Alice Springs not offer the means of by-passing it altogether," he said.

If elected as mayor at the May 28 elections Ald Millard said he would lobby the Government and the Tourist Commission to place greater emphasis on the promotion of Alice Springs as the hub for the Centre.

'Yulara must complement other attractions in the region not compete with them," he said

ation executive officer Lynne Peterkin said Alice Springs could never be by-passed because it was Central Australia's "dormitory."

"There is no accommodation offered anywhere in the region where people can stay longer than one or two days," she said.

"Accommodation at Yulara is so tight people cannot expect to walk off a plane and find somewhere to stay."
