Your federal organisation continues to work tirelessly in support of the Howard Government. As I travel across Australia I sense a strong recognition that the Howard Government has a clear agenda for protecting, securing and building Australia's future.

In a time of continuing global uncertainty, the responsible economic management of the Howard Government has enabled Australia to ride out the current international economic downturn while still being able to afford greater measures to increase security for our nation and our borders. We live in uncertain times as evidenced most starkly by the Bali atrocity and our involvement, rightly, in freeing the Iraqi people. The world changed on September 11, 2001 and Australia is not immune from world events.

I want to thank not only the hard working Liberal Members and Senators but also our volunteer unpaid party members who work tirelessly in support of their elected members behind the scenes. Congratulations to Andrew Robb who was recently awarded an Officer in the Order of Australia (General Division). Andrew continues his tireless work for the Liberal Party through the NSW Division.

We rely on robust policy debate from which the Federal Government can garner an understanding of the views of the membership.


We rely on the professionalism of the State Divisions to demonstrate to the public and to the business community that we are ready to govern at all levels of government.

International Report

The Liberal Party continues to value greatly its links with likeminded parties throughout the world through membership of the International Democrat Union and the Asia Pacific Democrat Union.

A highly successful Party Leaders Meeting was held by the International Democrat Union in Washington DC on 10 June. The Liberal Party's delegation was led by the Prime Minister. He was very well received at the meeting and was elected Chairman of the IDU for the next three years. His speech at the delegates' luncheon was one of the highlights of the occasion.

The Party Leaders Meeting heard reports from the more than 35 member parties present, and US Vice President Dick Cheney addressed the opening session. President Bush held a White House dinner for the delegation leaders. The previous Chairman, William Hague, was appointed as Deputy Chairman. Senator Robert Hill was among the Vice Chairmen re-elected.

Australia contributed 2 policy papers, on Reform of the United Nations and on New Approaches to Development Assistance, which were tabled in conjunction with the meeting and were well received.

A meeting of the IDU Executive had been held on 9 June. This was followed by a welcome dinner for delegates which was addressed by Karl Rove, a senior political adviser to the President and an outstanding political strategist.

The Prime Minister's first meeting as Chairman of the IDU Executive was in Mexico City on October 28.

2003 saw the successful holding of International Democrat Union meetings in Australia in early February.

The IDU's annual Young Leaders' Forum was held in Sydney on 2-4 February, the first time it has been held in Australia. This was the best attended Forum yet, with 77 participants from 29 countries.

There were numerous speakers from around the world on a range of election campaigning and policy topics. Several Australian speakers were

people who have had key roles in successful Liberal election campaigns. The Prime Minister hosted a reception for delegates at Kirribilli House, and Malcolm Turnbull gave a cocktail party at his home.

The IDU Executive then met in Canberra on 5 February, chaired by the Prime Minister.

Among the decisions made was the setting up of a permanent Campaign Managers Committee to facilitate the

sharing of campaigning information between member parties. The Prime Minister then hosted a reception at The Lodge. During this reception, he made a special presentation to Joy Mein, in recognition of the years of service she has given as Chairman of the International Women's Democrat Union.

The meetings were highly successful, and overseas delegates expressed great appreciation for Australian hospitality.

The Liberal Party also actively involves itself with the Asia Pacific Democrat Union. A meeting of the Council of the APDU was held in Washington on 11 June, at which reports were received from member parties, including a presentation by Lynton Crosby on the 2001 Australian election campaign. Tony Eggleton was re-elected as Chairman and Bruce Edwards was elected as Executive Secretary.

The APDU next met in Canberra on 6 February 2003. That meeting was briefed by Daniel Calingaert, Asia Director of the International Republican Institute, on the IRI's work in this region. He also held a separate meeting with the Federal Secretariat, and arising from this there may be opportunities in the future for some closer involvement of the Liberal Party with the IRI's programs in Asia.
