Disturbed men go to women's section of jail

Five behaviorally disturbed men will be moved to the women's section of the Alice Springs Jail this week.

LATE NEWS

The decision was announced by Correctional Services Minister Don Dale after he opened the motor vehicle number plate factory on Friday.

Mr Dale said the four women inmates would be moved to a house in the Gap area near Giles House as soon as possible.

"Moving the behaviorally disturbed men to the women's section is temporary at this stage,"

"If the move is successful then the department might consider making it a permanent solution.

"By moving the five men into the women's section it will allow us to manage them better."

He said the department could look at making the section sound proof.

Mr Dale said there was no real solution to the problem of behaviorally disturbed.

It is not clear what would happen to two behaviorally disturbed women who are often in and out of the women's section on a regular basis. A prison officer has said that one behaviorally

disturbed woman who was violent had to be locked in a secure prison cell 24 hours a day. Alice Springs Miscellaneous Workers Union spokesman Ron Tishler said the issue was not making the women's section sound proof but setting them out of the inil

getting them out of the jail. He said the prison officers did not have expertise to handle behaviorally disturbed pris-

Mr Tishler said there were no facilities available in the jail to care for behaviorally disturbed people who prison officers felt were being "treated like dogs."

The five prisoners have been undergoing psychiatric assessment following a directive from Mr
