League drug decision due-

SYDNEY. - Police Drug Enforcement Agency officers will make a decision today on whether New South Wales rugby league players tested positive for illegal drugs will face charges.

"At this stage the matter will be discussed later today and a decision made on what action, if any, will be taken," a Drug Enforcement Agency spokesman said. The results of drug tests conducted by the Australian Sports Drug Agency or June 18 in which 10 South Sydney players showed traces of cocaine and what was thought to be marijuana were released at the weekend.

One player, fullback Scott Wilson, 19, had his contract cancelled after recording a drug test positive to cocaine.

Nine players tested positive to

illegal recreational drugs, believed to be marijuana.

Should charges be laid against the players, the spokesman said he believed it would be the first time drug testing had led to criminal proceedings.

Twelve players from three other Sydney Winfield Cup rugby league clubs were drugtested after yesterday's matches.
